LIST OF WORKS

Where the People Will Go brings together new and existing works by Danish artist Tue Greenfort. Together they present his response to the South London Gallery's history and architecture, its changing role within its local context and its relationship with neighbouring Sceaux Gardens housing estate.

The exhibition builds on Greenfort's work over the past ten years, as well as ideas he began to explore when he made a sitespecific work for the 2009 group show at the SLG, Beyond These Walls. At that time he created a direct access route from the estate to the gallery, shifting the physical relationship between the two locations and making access between the gallery and the estate possible in a new way. The costs of staffing the entrance meant that it could not remain in permanent use but it has been re-activated as one of many elements in his current show. Drawing on themes related to environmentalism. The Commons and political ecology, Greenfort also makes specific reference to the SLG's history and location.

Responding to the statement "the source of art is in the life of a people" which is inlaid in the gallery's original Walter Crane floor, Greenfort re-configures the marquetry design within a fabric sculpture. Another work takes as its point of departure the 1972 book *Limits to Growth*, which became seminal reading for environmentalists and policy makers and was translated into many languages. Greenfort presents a collection of different versions of the book's cover alongside food packaging and other items on supermarket shelves in a comment on the complexities surrounding environmental issues.

A series of recycling bags expose the diverse approaches to waste management across London boroughs, resulting from the privatisation under Margaret Thatcher of these services, and the subsequent stagnation in policymakers' ability to create a more effective, unified and advanced system for the whole city.

An audio installation, through sound feedback, explores the contrasting environments between the front and rear of the gallery, between the soundscapes of Peckham Road and Sceaux Gardens estate. In a further comment on the cyclical and interconnected nature of relationships forged through the gallery's specific context, edible mushrooms have been cultivated by the artist on coffee grounds sourced from the gallery's café and will be incorporated into a special dish throughout the exhibition. 1. 
