WORKING PROGRESS

Following an open invitation to the South London Gallery's (SLG) Front of House team, 26 artists re-imagine and transform their everyday place of work with this exhibition that showcases their varied practices.

As artists emerging in the internet age, the relationship between the physical self and the digital world is a focal point and surfaces in many of the works, for example **Chai Kamrai**'s series #dankmemesbutitsme in which the prevalence of memes in pop culture is subverted and reinterpreted. **Rachel Cheung**'s work looks further ahead, exploring science fiction and the future of the human, using 3D printing, textiles and plastics in her costumes to explore the future of humanity. For several artists, there is a tension between the impact of digital production on artistic practice and reconnecting with traditional forms, such as **Ian Malhotra**'s printmaking and **Alice Campos**'s analogue photography.

A number of works explore how language and information is shared through different networks including digital, societal or, as in the work of **Jennifer O'Farrell**, fungal.

Iona Moncrieff's *Cold Pressed Controversy* is a satirical take on big corporations, marketing and the news cycle. Using products that benefitted from 'organic press' (free publicity that is gained as a result of controversy) Moncreiff has 'juiced' these infamous products and presented them as blended health drinks. Toxic substances derived from the capitalist marketplace also appear in **Avril Corroon**'s work, which preserves the mould found growing in the bathroom of her rental accommodation.


Tradition, heritage and ancestry are a crucial influence on works such as **Cain the Abyss**'s *The Restoration of Power: An Ancestral Epic,* which is inspired by the life of 17th century Queen Nzinga of the Ndongo and Matamba Kingdoms of the Mbundu, who fiercely defended her lands against colonialist forces. The history of colonialism and its continued impact on modern society is also central to the work of **Davinia-Ann Robinson**.

Identity, the body, race and gender appear as thematic threads running through the work of several of the artists. *Origins*, a film by **Gaby Sahhar**, examines femininity in the context of patriarchy. **Tyreis Holder**'s works explore the experience of a black woman navigating predominantly white spaces.


The reinterpretation of reality and familiar objects is brought up in **Gonçalo Birra**'s , or else merry Dissidents, while **Joshua Phillips**'s work uses a mixture of photography and found objects to explore the symbolism generated from such quotidian objects.

A series of performances will take place across the course of the exhibition, including **Eleni Papazoglou**'s instructional piece *In the roof of my mouth for 20 minutes*, which will be performed by **Nina Davies** on the opening evening and then by Eleni herself on 7 and 21 March and 11 April, at 2pm. **Tyreis Holder** will perform on the opening evening and on Wednesday 11, 25 March and 22 April at 6.30pm. On Saturday 4 April a special event will take place in the SLG's Clore Studio with performances by artist **Ben Whateley** and other members of the Front of House team.


