
INTRODUCTION

Céline Condorelli's work addresses the boundaries between public and private, art and function, work and leisure, in order to reimagine what culture and society can be, and the role of artists within them.

Condorelli's exhibition at the South London Gallery explores themes of labour, play and public space. In 2019 the SLG commissioned Condorelli to create a playground for the nearby Elmington estate, one of three estates with which the SLG has a long-standing relationship.

The process of making this playground is the starting point for a reflection on the relationship between work and free-time, highlighting the hidden labour in the production of culture both inside and outside the gallery. A new immersive installation includes a film by Condorelli made in collaboration with artist and filmmaker Ben Rivers, a poem written and recited by poet Jay Bernard features on the film's soundtrack. The installation also includes a sculpture which functions as seating from which to view the film, in keeping with Condorelli's interest in support structures and forms of display.

The exhibition features further work which relates to inspirations behind the project, specifically the work of Italian/Brazilian architect Lina Bo Bardi and Dutch architect Aldo van Eyck who, between 1947 and 1978, used play to transform public spaces in São Paulo and Amsterdam respectively. The exhibition investigates the relationship between exhibition-making and public art, reflecting on the artist's interest in connecting the gallery space with the world outside.

GALLERY 2

Spatial Composition 13, 2021 Mild steel, fabric, paint Variable dimensions Collection Museo Macro, Rome

This sculpture functions as gallery seating, providing a position from which visitors can look at the film work also shown in the space. The piece reflects on the opposition between work and free time, if the gallery is seen as an institution of leisure that performs the notion of time freed from work, while displaying the product of cultural workers. Using the formal language of playground structures and deck chairs, this work addresses how seating impacts on the experience of spending time with art.

Condorelli's record on a turntable could also be thought of as a spinning model. It plays the sound of the artist's studio with all the windows open 'to let the city in', as architect Frederick Kiesler insisted was important for exhibition contexts. It also features the sound of children playing, as well as pianist John Tilbury playing *All about the Piano* by composer John Lely – a track which Condorelli frequently listened to at the time of making this work.
